


6. The Pursuit of Increased Learning: Coalescing Assessment Strategies at a Large Research University

This is the latest IR Applications paper from AIR. Assessment drives significant change in higher education. Colleges and universities are being asked to publish expected learning outcomes for each of their programs; provide evidence that the expected learning outcomes are realized by students; and demonstrate how such data collection and analyses lead to continuous improvement of student learning, the curriculum, and the university. This is a significant challenge, especially for large schools with many students.

This paper presents a working yet evolving model of an institutional assessment and analysis plan; obstacles and challenges associated with implementing the plan; innovative strategies—some technological—employed to address the obstacles and challenges; a college-wide application of a systems approach to assessment; and lessons learned and future strategies. Institutional, college-wide, discipline-specific, and individual faculty perspectives to a systems approach of bridging assessment, learning outcomes, and accreditation are presented. The importance of student involvement throughout the process is highlighted.

10. Marking to the curve


Many AAIRies will have read the newspaper reports of the study by UNSW economist Gigi Foster which found that international students in at least two Australian university business schools were awarded lower marks than other students and that domestic students in tutorials which big numbers of international students got lower marks than domestic students in tutorials without big numbers of international students. AAIRies may also want to check the description of the doctoral degree to determine whether their institution's doctorates with coursework are within the new framework. 

ESMU-EAIE Benchmarking Workshop

13 September 2011

MATTERS RAISED WITH DEEWR **Load Planning Software**

At AAIR's 2010 Annual Forum, members raised the idea that DEEWR could assist the sector by providing a general load planning software tool for use by Universities.

Members not involved in Load Planning and Forecasting, may not be aware, but in March DEEWR asked Universities to provide load estimates for each year to 2014. No doubt each university used its available resources to construct an estimate that could be provided by such a software tool.

The request for such a tool, was driven by the desire to promote efficiencies in the sector and avoid duplication, given that in the absence of any general software, each University was developing its own models and systems.

In contacting DEEWR, they recommended AAIR work through Universities Australia to establish that a broad interest existed and that Universities Australia was the appropriate group to consider this matter.

Access to Key Data

The second matter raised was in relation to the common issues within Universities in replicating the new interim Low SES Indicator.

Members not familiar with this issue may not realize that Universities are unable to replicate the data underlying the interim SES Indicator due to access issues to Census Collection data level data and Centrelink data.

DEEWR advice was that it would "publish the proportion of low SES students in each State/Territory for benchmarking purposes" and with respect to Centrelink data "will provide each university with an annual count of their students receiving selected Centrelink payments in 2011."

DEEWR also advised that a "sector wide forum to discuss the development of the new University Experience Survey will be held in March/April 2011".

From the general perspective of AAIR, transparency and accessibility to data are paramount in not just replicating published information from DEEWR, but providing insights into the achievement of the Government's participation targets. The current lack of

transparency is handicapping the quality of strategies to seek to realize the Government's participation target.

It would be hoped that the final SES Measure, is fully transparent and can be reproduced by Institutional Researchers across the sector.

NatBes

A number of members as well as other users, have queried when the 2009 data will be available to NatBes, the National Benchmarking System for Student Collection data.

NatBes was been completed by Edith Cowan University, which received the funding by DEEWR to build the system on behalf of the sector under Workplace Productivity Program funding. As the system is now complete, DEEWR has indicated that it will no longer provide data, upon which the system is dependent.

A number of organizations and universities have approached DEEWR to review its decision.
