Best New Presenter – Samer Saad, from one of our corporate sponsors, eXplorance, was voted 'Best New Presenter'. His presentation had '[A fresh look at Response Rates- Best practises for online Course Evaluations](#)'.



The New AAIR Website



If you hadn't noticed, [AAIR's new website](#) is up and running. Liesha Northover, who has done a fantastic job populating the site with the rich content that had been a feature of the old website, gave us a run down on some of its new features during a lunch break at the Forum.

There was just a small number in the audience so I can probably assume that a little tour here wouldn't go astray.

This is a work-in-progress and not all of the content has been migrated from the old website. But a lot is

there and growing by the week. By early in the New Year, we should have caught up with the backlog.

The website is now packaged in a more contemporary look and feel as well as providing a more sophisticated 'back end' to allow us to manage the content more effectively.

We have also added some new features which I'll introduce you to shortly.

There's a lot 'About' AAIR that you'll find useful such as the Rules, Mission and Objectives, the Code of Ethics, AAIR's organisational structure etc. Worth a look at some stage.

Then we've got the usual links to all the papers and presentations for the [AAIR Fora](#) (I presume that 'Fora' is plural for 'Forum'). Again they're not all there yet but we're progressively adding more and more. The past few years are definitely there.

I recently sent out a call to register on the website. If you chose to register, then you will have access to one of the new features: [the Knowledge Base](#) (you can only enter this part of the website if you have registered). To date around 100 people have taken the opportunity to register which is fantastic.

These Knowledge Base discussion groups will allow you to tap into other's knowledge on topics such as business intelligence, equity in higher education, issues in NZ higher education, student surveys etc. The list is up to you. We've set up a few but if you'd like to start a new discussion group then simply let either [Liesha Northover](#) or me know.

We do however need to have a moderator or convenor for each of the topic areas. So here's a call for all you inspired AAIRies, to help us make this a success by putting your name forward either against one of the topics already established or if you want to establish your own.



Training and Development

The [Data and Decisions Academy](#) is a series of online, self-paced courses designed for busy community college institutional research (IR) professionals in the US.

During Fall 2009, the Academy piloted three initial courses: Foundational Statistics for Decision Support, Foundations of Data Management, and Designing IR Research. Survey Design, Learning Outcomes, and Longitudinal Tracking for IR debuted Fall 2010. Future Academy plans include intermediate and advanced training, as well as courses for other segments of the IR community.

The courses are accessible without travel or special software, and are designed for busy employees who need on-the-job and on-the-go training. Through a unique learning portal, Academy participants will acquire the knowledge and skills to perform a critical IR function in about 10 hours of study and exercises. With an investment of approximately 25 hours, participants can complete the entire course and obtain a broader knowledge base of IR competencies.

AIR also offer a range of face-to-face training in what are called "Institutes".
